FROM FIREWORKS TO FIZZLEWORKS TO POSSIBLY NOWORKS

Most of our Angle Lake community is quite aware that the 4th of July holiday has always been the highlight for activities around the lake capped off by our traditional fireworks show. Unfortunately, the past two years we have suffered from the unprofessional and negligent execution of the show by the fireworks contractor, Eagle Fireworks. Subsequently our newly formed 'Fireworks Committee' (FWC) made up of Steve Beck, Fuzz Hill, Jim Todd and yours truly have been working hard to respond to the results of the 'Fireworks Survey' sent out the first of this year. The details of those results are posted under the blog site, but I'll just summarize the outcome for those of you who may still be technologically challenged.

FINAL POLL RESULTS

Of the 249 ballots sent out, we rec'd ------ 112 votes OPTION 1 (Turn fireworks over to City) rec'd ------ 33 votes OPTION 2 (ALSC Sole Control, Scale back show w/ investment for new dock) rec'd ------ 19 votes OPTION 3 (ALSC Sole Control, Maintain current show w/ capital call for new dock) rec'd ------ 14 votes OPTION 4 (ALSC maintain partnership with City & Negotiate best deal possible) rec'd ------ 46 votes

These results were interpreted by your board to mean that over 70% of our voting members wanted a fireworks show of some type. The primary challenge of course would be our ability to secure a 1,400 sf Temporary Floating Platform (TFP) to deliver the type of show we had evolved towards. Using the services of an outside contractor the bids we received indicated the cost to produce a modular TFP of this size would be around \$30K so we were motivated to seek other less expensive alternatives.

When we learned the City had plans to replace the existing concrete fishing dock at the Angle Lake Park the FWC investigated the possibility of repurposing these docks to use as our TFP. Despite their somewhat tortured outward

appearance we thought, from their structural and dimensional aspects, they would be well suited for our needs. Kit Ledbetter of the City of SeaTac Parks and Recreation Department assisted the committee by doing some additional detective work regarding the legality of our being able to keep these floats on the lake. Kit received a determination from the City that if we titled these as 'Barges' we would be able to moor them similar to how a boat is moored thus avoiding the current design restrictions imposed on dock construction. The City could then sell these dock sections to the ALSC at a surplus cost of \$1.00 apiece versus the city having to pay the expense to destroy them. Once the sale was complete, the ALSC would be responsible for retrofitting them for the

intended use by the club. At first glance, the concept to reuse these existing concrete floats rather than construct new wood floats looked very inviting from a cost saving standpoint to the Club. However, this plan was not without additional challenges and risks that required our further investigation.

First Challenge - Come up with a design for coupling, towing, anchoring and mooring the concrete sections when not in use as the TFP and price out the work.

Second Challenge - Find a new fireworks contractor and pyrotechnician to replace the one we terminated.

Third Challenge - Find homes for the completed barges when not in use as the TFP.

At this point, it appears we

addressed all the pieces necessary to put on a show for 2014 and we proceeded in good faith to work in partnership with the City as part of their Festival Committee. However as we dug further into all the layers of detail, we became very concerned that each challenge had a degree of risk and difficulty that we were increasingly uncomfortable with.

The cost estimates from one contractor experienced in retrofitting dock configurations of this type assessed the work necessary to be over \$20,000 forcing us to consider doing the work ourselves utilizing volunteer labor. It became evident there were too many moving parts, too many risks and far too many unknowns the club would be exposed to from such issues as: the unknown

quantity or quality of volunteers, the absence of a committed date for which we could take possession of the docks, the uncertainty of how much time it might take us to complete retrofitting of the docks, unfavorable language in the firework contractors contract which would bind us to conditions beyond our control, the additional overhead in reaching an agreement with shoreline residents who might be able to store the barges when not in use after the show, etc., etc.. Upon presentation of these risks and concerns, the ALSC board voted unanimously to back away from performing a fireworks show this year.

We immediately notified the head of the SeaTac Festival Committee, Kit Ledbetter, of this decision and were then asked by Kit what exactly it was that the ALSC would be willing to do so that we could still work together to put the show on. As a result, the ALSC called an emergency meeting that evening. After a lengthy discussion that took us into the late hours of the evening, the board proposed the following;

- The City would be required to take responsibility for the retrofitting of the barges and insure they would be ready to be moved into place by the 13th of June.
- 2. ALSC members would donate the labor to help the city detach and tow each section to the staging area and assist with the assembly and anchorage.

- 3. The City would be sole signatory of the fireworks contract that ALSC had previously negotiated for a \$22,500 show.
- 4. ALSC would make a cash contribution of \$14,000 to the city to be applied towards the show.

The FWC notified Kit the following morning and he said he would present this at an emergency meeting of the Festival Committee made up of council members Barry Landenberg, Pam Fernald and Dave Bush. Kit advised me that in his presentation to the Festival Committee he laid out the following options:

- 1. Cancel the Fireworks Show;
- Raise more money to work with the ALSC to put on the show;
- Have the City put on a much smaller show staged from the existing dock at the park.

Kit contacted us the next day informing us that the Festival Committee had elected to put on a much smaller show themselves.

So ultimately, yes, there will be a fireworks show on the lake, but not an ALSC sponsored show. From what we have been told, the City's show will be staged from the existing fishing pier at the public park and will be a much smaller show than in the past, utilizing 2" and 3" shells depending on what the Fire Marshall will allow to be launched from the existing docks. It is our opinion that the show will be somewhere in the \$6,000 -\$10,000 range based on the knowledge that the City had verbally committed \$6,000 toward this year's display (a reduced commitment from previous years due to the issues we experienced with the previous contractor) and whereas the City still has a \$10,000 budget for fireworks.

For those of you along the northeast and westerly shoreline the show will most likely be obscured from view, and for that I am sorry, however I am sure that neighbors along the north and south shoreline would welcome your company to view the show.

THE PARADE, BUD JONES MEMORIAL RUN/WALK AROUND THE LAKE, SWIM RACES AND BOAT RACES WILL STILL GO ON AS USUAL, HOWEVER, WE DO NOT ANTICIPATE ANY FLARE SHOW TO ACCOMPANY THE FIREWORKS SHOW AT THIS TIME.

Now we, the board, must evaluate and determine what it is the ALSC is willing to do relative to putting on a show for the next and subsequent years. This means:

- First reconfirm how committed the majority of members are toward continuing with a community fireworks show and if so;
- 2. Raising the money, via a capital call to our members, to fund the barge construction and;
- Find a team of volunteers to design and build the 'barges' then;

- 4. Secure a location where we can construct and launch the barges, then;
- Determine the criteria and terms for those interested in mooring the barges and finally;
- 6. Find volunteers willing and able to moor the barges alongside their docks when not in use by the Club.

This is a year for each of you to evaluate just how important a fireworks show is to your 4th of July celebration. You can expect more information to be shared on this subject in the near future, via special flyer, after our next board meeting. Meanwhile, I urge each ALSC member to contact any of the board members to discuss your feelings on this subject to help guide us in our decision making process or to indicate where you can offer future help in the areas specified above, if we make a decision to continue the tradition of an ALSC hosted fireworks show.

Therefore, I leave you with this thought:

It is my opinion that Kit Ledbetter, the director of parks and recreation for the City of SeaTac, supports a collaborative approach with our community for a fireworks show, however, it is your' City Council, (more specifically The Festival Committee) who must provide guidance to Kit to formulate a path to achieve that collaboration. Now that public activities have been added in the park (all day music and Rotary Carnival) it is evident that our festival

committee/council members agree that a fireworks display is the most appropriate way to end the day of celebration by determining to go forward with a show on their own this year. But because the fireworks show will not be staged in a position where all members around the lake can view it, we've determined that ALSC funds cannot be used to support it. So I ask myself, why is it I perceive resistance when approaching our City leaders to make even the smallest investment of our tax dollars to support a community organization like the Angle Lake Shore Club, a volunteer organization, who

continually strives to make this neighborhood and our community a better place to live?

While we truly appreciate the City's past financial contributions to our show, I often wonder how much your elected officials really appreciate the volunteer efforts of, not only the ALSC, but also other similar volunteer organizations that impact and benefit, not only our neighborhood, but our entire community at large. While 'Neighborhoods Without Borders' is an admirable goal working towards unifying our city, it has to start with first unifying 'neighbors' and that's exactly what we do.

So this 4th of July, while the FIREWORKS may only be 'FIZZLEWORKS' this year, it is still better than 'NOWORKS' and I think the residents of our community deserve better. But without a TFP the show you will experience is the best we can expect. I hope each of you embrace the gathering of family and friends during the holiday and think about what it is that's truly important this 4th of July. Also, please think about how we may want to

celebrate the holiday next year. I urge you to discuss your ideas and opinions on the merits of continuing to host our own ALSC fireworks show with your neighbors, your ALSC board members or post your thoughts on the blog site (anglelakesc.blogspot.com); the Facebook page (anglelakesc) or our own private social network site at anglelake.nextdoor.com). The more input we receive the more it will help us work towards a common goal that the majority can support.

Yep, spring is in the air and Shirley, Harlow and Carol Stevens have again graciously agreed to again host the 2014 ANGLE LAKE FISHING DERBY this year by allowing the ALSC the use of their beach along with the Russ & Patti Austin allowing us the use of their convenient restroom facilities.

Whether you fish or just want to socialize, this event is open to anyone who purchases at least one raffle ticket. This ticket not only enters our fishermen into the derby but also entitles the bearer to morning coffee and donuts followed by a fabulous barbeque lunch and the possibility of winning some awesome raffle prizes.

Good luck to all you anglers and remember that when you arrive to 'check in' you must have your raffle ticket and fishing license (if required by law) in your possession to enter the derby and be eligible for some great derby prizes including the \$100 first prize.

We'll also have a nice bonfire going for those fishing who want to stop in and get warmed up before heading back out on the water and for those that just want to hang out and visit. Remember that all proceeds from the ticket sales go to support the derby. Last year's revenue from raffle ticket sales did improve and as a result we were able to add a nice kayak to our list of raffle prizes.

Like last year we hope to be adding more raffle prizes providing sales are up. This year our prizes will again consist of two (2) tickets for this year's ALSC Christmas Party (\$60 value), four (4) tickets to this year's Tasty Tapas (\$100 value), Bowling Party gift certificates (each for up to 10 bowlers valued at \$150 each and generously donated by Pat and Val Johns owners of the Hi-Line Bowling Alley) and a grand prize or two that are still to be determined. Tickets will also be available on the day of the derby for all you procrastinators.

As always I must remind you that while only one (1) raffle ticket per person is required to enter you into the raffle drawing, to participate in the fishing derby with the first prize for biggest trout set at \$100 and indulge in all the scrumptious food being served we urge you to buy as many tickets as possible. This is not only to increase your chances of winning one of the great prizes offered but also to help support this event. dynamic interface that enables unassisted communication between Lakeside residents and beyond.



We are pleased to report that within just one year, 72 neighbors in the Angle Lake Neighborhood have signed up for and are using this service today. Additionally we are now actively communicating at will with 5 other SeaTac Area Neighborhoods who have also created their own secure sites!

Recent communication threads have included brainstorming ideas and offering suggestions to help combat rampant mail theft that is common in all six neighborhoods and users have also shared and promoted local entertainment and event information as recommendations for things to do on the upcoming weekend, one individual even offered a free weekend Condo in Leavenworth due to scheduling conflicts and not being able to use the facility as originally planned!
