Established in 1934, the Angle Lake Shore Club board takes enormous pride in being recognized as an active and successful neighborhood social organization. The club was founded when a group of like-minded individuals came together with similar goals toward preserving the environment and improving livability on the lake. Throughout the many decades, the club has flexed and adapted to meet the changing interests and needs of the membership including organizing a movement for the installation of sewer lines and encouraging residents to replace their reliance on septic tanks. The club also focused on building community by forming yearly events such as: the fishing derby, the Fourth of July activities (including the totem triathlon and fireworks display), and the Christmas party featuring progressive hors-d'oeuvre and dinner. The organization even built and maintained a clubhouse for many years until interest waned, and they sold it.

Eighty-Six years and the club objectives are still the same - continue to care for our environment and sustain a desirable level of enjoyment and quality of life for the happiness and health of the community. Membership Definitions

The ALSC offers two annual membership options where 100% of the membership fees collected go toward club operations and event expenses.

\$10 Single Membership. Any individual 18 years or older may enroll in a Single Membership entitling them to all club benefits.

\$20 Family Membership. A family is two or more members who live in the same home and are related by birth, marriage or adoption.

Household and Family are often used interchangeably, however, the board is making a careful distinction between the two terms. A household is defined as one or more persons living in the same house, condominium or apartment where they may or may not be related. Think of it this way; All families are also households, but not all households are families.

With changing residency options where more homes are being partitioned into rental space, the board determined an update in membership definitions was necessary to avoid confusion.








WHAT'S IN STORE IN 2016 FOR YOUR ALSC

First, looking back on last year, I'm happy to report that each of our events realized an increase in the number of neighors participating. Plus we're thrilled to announce that our "HALLOWEEN SPOOK-TACULAR BONE-VOYAGE CRUISE" and the CHRISTMAS TREE LIGHTING CEREMONY, both new for 2015, were big successes and will return again this year.

Second, we are looking to change the dates for a few events:

FISHING DERBY will be on Sunday, April 24th in the hopes that moving it closer to the date they stock the lake with fish will improve fishing results.

- SPOOK-TACULAR BONE VOYAGE CRUISE will happen on the Sunday Eve before Halloween due to Halloween falling on a Monday.
- SANTA CRUISE will be moved to Saturday. Santa's sleigh will glide onto the waters of Angle Lake at dark to better accommodate parents who want to incorporate Santa into their kids' parties that day and to allow the adults to unwind after all the work that goes into greeting Santa to ensure his visit is a memorable one for the kids.

Third, the majority of board members are still very much interested in bringing a weekend Hydroplane race to Angle Lake the second weekend of September as a ONE TIME TRIAL event. To move this forward, we must be sure that a majority of lakeside residents are in favor of this. Our goal is to have each shoreline resident sign one of three petitions that would be presented this spring.

- one would be in favor allowing the races one time, on a TRIAL basis
- one would be against the races
- one would be indicating an indifference to the races one way or the other.

Fourth, on the 4th OF JULY, we will still have the: PARADE, DOCK/BEACH JUDGING, WALK/RUN AROUND THE LAKE, SWIM RACES AND BOAT RACES and PARADE OF DECORATED BOATS. However, we are uncertain of the status of a FIREWORKS DISPLAY. As most of you are aware, there has been not only a significant turnover in the majority of seats on the City Council but also in many key positions in City's staff. Along with these changes, I anticipate that support from the City for a FIREWORKS SHOW may also change unless they can secure necessary funding from private parties. And without barges, the ALSC remains incapable of producing a show of our own.

Finally, this brings me to the VERY IMPORTANT topic regarding our BARGE program. In our fall newsletter, we disclosed that we were roughly \$10,000 short of our \$24,000 goal needed to finance the construction of 6-7 barges necessary to bring the fireworks back to the middle of the lake. At our first official ALSC board meeting of 2016, it was reported that we had raised an additional \$2,000 leaving us now short only \$8,000. The amount of funds collected thus far enables the club to build 4-1/2 (so let's call it 5) of the 7 barges required to stage a \$20,000 show. The ALSC Board remains unanimous in its desire to keep the fund raising alive and voted in favor of proceeding with the next step of reconfirming interest with those who've previously provided verbal commitment to partner in the ownership of these barges. The ALSC is also still committed to fully refund the money from donors, if a minimum number of formal committed partners cannot be achieved and the barge program is terminated. Let's hope this is not the case and we can achieve our fundraising goal by the end of April so we can commence building the barges using all volunteer labor and put on a grand fireworks show in 2017.

One hundred and seven neighbors gathered lakeside January 1st to ring in the New Year, polar bear style! It was the best Angle Lake Polar Plunge yet! Gorgeous blue skies and a crisp air temperature of 38 degrees made the lake seem balmy at 42 degrees. Sixteen super-humans charged into the chilly waters at the stroke of noon cheered by 91 onlookers. Everyone enjoyed a scrumptious brunch of quiche, meatballs, pumpkin pie, croissant sandwiches, hot apple cider, muffins and more.

Best of all, everyone responded generously to our request to replenish the Highline Food Bank. Our wagon was overflowing with food. We gathered 240 pounds of food, double that of last year's take of 123 pounds. We also collected \$221 in cash, compared to \$145 last year!

The SeaTac fire department made an impressive show of support with five men arriving in two engines and two more arriving by boat and standing by on the dock with emergency rescue and resuscitation gear that was, thankfully, not needed. One fireman made an especially nice gesture upon parting; he handed his raffle tickets to young boys who had plunged into the lake. They watched their tickets intently as fabulous prizes were raffled, but, sadly, they didn't hold the winning numbers.

John Lucas, who set up the sound system for us, got the grand prize of a night stay at Cedarbrook Lodge. Five Angle Lake Shore Club shirts were raffled off along with other fabulous prizes generously donated by local businesses: a wooden bird feeder and suet donated by Wild Birds Unlimited in Burien, 2 spa treatments and 2 dinners at Cedarbrook Lodge and a haircut and style from The Ultimate Solutions Salon on 32^{nd} Ave S. and S. 188^{th} St. Trader Joes supplied \$35 worth of gluten free cookies and cakes for the celiacs among us to enjoy.

Jones Family Legacy: Memories on the Lake

Billie and Bud Jones purchased a cute little white bungalow next to their existing home in 1947 a few months after their wedding for a whopping price of \$5,300 in those days. They later built a new home in front of it, closer to the Lake. Children Nancy, Andy, and Kacey came along and added eleven grandchildren and nine greatgrandchildren.

It was a very active and busy household growing up on the Lake. They never locked the doors and all the neighborhood kids came and went as they wished. After chores, everyone was allowed to go swimming and boating and to catch frogs and make dish gardens. Nancy said it was 'magical' growing up on the lake and she couldn't imagine being anywhere else. It was a very safe place and her parents didn't worry about them at all. They had rules, but they knew better than to push the envelope. They didn't have docks in those days, so you had to learn to swim to go out to a raft before you could go boating. Needless to say, all the kids learned how to swim at a very young age.

The children attended and were bused to Angle Lake Elementary Grade School, north of 200th (it is gone now.) They then went to Chinook Middle School and Tyee High School. All the kids walked together. With no TV, movies or restaurants then, entertainment was Camp Fires and BBQ's on the beach. Everyone brought salads and desserts. They enjoyed full and happy family lives.

Billie and Bud were extremely active and social and would welcome each new resident to the lake. I, personally, had this honor. They were the first ones to welcome me to the lake. We went in their boat and motored everywhere as they regaled me with all of the history. They told me of a wonderful dance hall with hardwood floors at the Plunge, which is now the City Park and I learned so much about the area. They canned and preserved many items from their home grown veggie garden.

Bud and Billie were activists for the whole neighborhood and wrote many letters for good causes. Bud served as Sheriff of the Lake to get motor boats to slow down. This was really appreciated by all; it saved not only many docks but lives as well. Billie worked at the voting polls for years.

The Shore Club owned a nice building on S. 198th where many fun activities took place which included Halloween and Christmas parties, receptions and square dancing. It was later sold. Bud served as President of the Shore Club for many terms and Billie was right there doing whatever was needed. Bud played Santa for the neighborhood kids and Billie was a member of the Ladies Auxiliary.

Billie continued to swim every warm day last summer. She loved her afternoon cocktail and would sit and sip and just enjoy the lake in the afternoons. She attended every single ALSC activity, one way or another, including the tree lighting event and the last Christmas party, lately with one of her children by her side.

We will all miss her beaming smile and welcoming nature; the lakeside home will stay in the family and will be used by all family members.



A Brief History of the Angle Lake Shore Club

As recalled by Bonnie (Wheeler) Myhre Dated: February 2007



The Angle Lake Shore Club was started in the middle 1930s by a group of people who lived around the lake. As best I can recall, they were Art and Stella Newbill; Mary and Dale Hayes; Elliot and Lotsie Fallis; Corwin and Leah Dennis; Al and Betty Windsor; and Norm and Mid Soland. They met in various homes and offered a combination of social gatherings and looking at issues for the good of the community. There were not many people living on the Lake year round, as many had summer cabins and Angle Lake was a long way from Seattle, where most people worked. At that time, Des Moines Road and Military Road were the only access to Seattle from the Angle Lake area.

About 1937 the group acquired a piece of property on the south side of 198th street, where they decided to build a clubhouse. It was done mostly with volunteer labor and I believe Corwin Dennis was somewhat in charge of directing the building, as he was an excellent carpenter and made his living building houses.

The original building consisted of a large room – probably 30 ft. by 30 ft. – with a kitchen on the south side of the building and two small bathrooms. There was a large pot-bellied stove in the main room. They had put down good flooring in the main room so they could hold dances and other activities. They regularly held dinners at the Club as well as dances. There was a large grand parking area in the back of the club house and many a father took their young children there to learn to drive.

When I was in high school, the drama class put on a one-act play once a year and I remember our class going to the Shore Club meeting and putting on a play for them during their regular meeting.

The first big project that the Club handled was the installation of a water system. Up to that time everyone pumped water out of the lake. The installation took quite a while to implement, as a few of the residents were strongly opposed to spending the money for this project – but the Club was ultimately successful. A big water tower was

constructed near the intersection of 200th Street and Military Road and a couple times a year a few of the men would gather together for a cleaning party and scrub the tank.

The women formed an Auxiliary to help benefit the club and they were a very active group. Once a year they would hold a "Silver Tea" and invite the community – it was well attended. The ladies brought their best china and silver teapots, and made lovely dainty sandwiches. They did a lot of good for the club; keeping it clean and talking the men into coming about twice a year to wash windows!

At the end of World War II, the financial picture of the community was greatly improved and they built a large addition on the west side of the building that made a lovely dining room. At that time they also installed an oil furnace, which was a grand addition.

They held a dinner-dance every month with different members appointed to be in charge of decorating the rooms, providing an orchestra and serving a midnight dinner. Many times Al Sholberg and Sandy Taylor would provide the music, as Al could make the guitar sing and Sandy was a great piano player. The New Year's Eve dance was the highlight of the year with beautiful decorations and an elaborate midnight dinner. Everyone came back the next day to clean it up, eat the leftovers and in general talk about what a good time was had.

In 1965, the Club completed the project of installing sewers around the lake. This was accomplished largely due to the efforts of Sandy Taylor, who went door-to-door convincing people of the value of putting in sewers, and the many people who took petitions to all the residents of the lake to join the Des Moines Sewer District.

As time went on, fewer people were interested in coming to the affairs at the Club and a number of members felt it was time to sell the club house as it was falling on just a few people to keep up the grounds and the building. After selling the clubhouse (approximately the late '60s to early '70s), we held sporadic meetings but always had the Christmas party, which was a progressive affair. Many of the members opened their homes for hors d'oeuvres and drinks, after which we met at the local Lutheran church for the Christmas dinner.

The preceding was recalled by Bonnie Lou (Wheeler) Myhre who was born on August 20, 1924 to Ame and Bill Wheeler and lived in the Angle Lake area of South Seattle for 60 years. She graduated from Highline High School and attended the University of Washington. She

was married to Kenneth Myhre for 63 years. Bonnie passed away September 5, 2014 and is survived by her son, Karl and his wife, Sherilyn; her granddaughter, Misa and her husband Mike Reardon; her great-granddaughter, Imani Paige Reardon, and numerous nieces and nephews and their children.




